How many patients under the age of 2 versus the total number of admissions on an annual basis? 2-3 patients 3. What is the primary diagnosis for patients under the age of 2? Congenital Heart Disease, encephalopathy 4. Outside of therapies and PM&R, what other services comprise your medial team for the under 2 population? For example, do you have pediatricians, gastroenterologists, neurologists, or developmental psychologists? Consults if necessary of these sub specialists are provided 5. What outcome measures do you primarily utilize for the under 2 years of age population? We utilize clinical findings, referring to the Bailey 6. Could you share your checklist of education/training for the parents/caregivers? (ie: safe sleep, feeding schedule, signs/symptoms to monitor while feeding, car seat positioning, 24 hour care, etc..) All of these are given and made sure mostly safety- positioning, feeding techniques, mobility techniques. Referral for EI or outpatient services <p>The major purpose of inpatient rehab of these patients is due these patients being seen in the ICU's and benefit from a short stay in inpatient rehab unit to address safety and functional outcomes. Once the family feels educated and a safety plan (feeding, mobility, communication/engagement and equipment received) patient is discharged and transitioned to EI or outpatient services.</p>

How many patients under the age of 2 versus the total number of admissions on an annual basis? Fluctuates. About 8-10% of total admissions average over the last two years. 3. What is the primary diagnosis for patients under the age of 2? TBI/Trauma, Cancer, variable, I do not perceive a 'primary' enough in this patient population. 4. Outside of therapies and PM&R, what other services comprise your medial team for the under 2 population? For example, do you have pediatricians, gastroenterologists, neurologists, or developmental psychologists?

	<p>Nothing more specific to the under 2 years population; we have Child Life Specialists, Music Therapy available to all and the list of specialists you mentioned are available as needed for each individual plan of care, though they may not be primary on the team when on the rehab unit.</p> <p>5. What outcome measures do you primarily utilize for the under 2 years of age population? WeeFIM is the only assessment we use across the board, anything else is based on therapist determining need for the individual patient.</p> <p>6. Could you share your checklist of education/training for the parents/caregivers? (ie: safe sleep, feeding schedule, signs/symptoms to monitor while feeding, car seat positioning, 24 hour care, etc..) Very individualized per patient/family need, but could include all tasks you listed plus: plus safe handling/carrying/transferring/positioning, use of specialized equipment as needed, adjustments to strollers/mobility bases, signs/symptoms to monitor in any activity that would indicate distress or concern and how to adjust and modify to help young child cope/calm, safe play/interaction with siblings/family/pets, nursing is addressing education needs for follow up medications, bowel & bladder management, tube feedings, etc or other medical equipment needed in the home, this list could be long.</p>

We do keep this data but I need to reach out to the nursing director to obtain the specific information.</p> <p>3. What is the primary diagnosis for patients under the age of 2? Feeding disorders, delayed milestones, non accidental trauma, HemOnc</p> <p>4. Outside of therapies and PM&R, what other services comprise your medial team for the under 2 population? What is the primary diagnosis for patients under the age of 2? NAT, TBI, CVA 4. Outside of therapies and PM&R, what other services comprise your medial team for the under 2 population? For example, do you have pediatricians, gastroenterologists, neurologists, or developmental psychologists? We have all of those medical teams except developmental psychologists 5. In 2020, we had 13 unique patients ages 3 years and younger (sorry, that's the way our data is sorted), of 164 total unique patient admissions (7.9%) ... so maybe 5% 2 and younger?? 3. What is the primary diagnosis for patients under the age of 2? Non-accidental trauma/brain injury, some infant botulism 4. Outside of therapies and PM&R, what other services comprise your medial team for the under 2 population?
